Perspectives on Working at the Frontlines of the Opioid Epidemic: The Mission, Evidence, and Reality

Being on the forefront of initiatives to confront and treat our community members suffering from opioid dependence can be incredibly rewarding. It also comes with challenges that many of us were never able to anticipate. Traditional approaches that have been effective with other forms of substance use and dependence often feel incomplete in this arena, and the consequences of untreated use are often deadly, making the stakes feel that much higher for both clients/patients, and for providers, This presentation will speak to emerging science on the neurobiological nature of opioid dependence, pragmatic approaches to helping patients work the recovery process, and on the cultural shift in perspective and inspiration needed to be as effective as possible with this population.

Overdose Postvention Practices in Behavioral Health

The purpose of this training is to provide a macro-level overview on the topic of opioid overdoses, including grief and traumatization issues for behavioral health professionals. This hour- long, training will cover some of the factors that have contributed to increased opioid overdose fatalities in recent years, and will provide some strategies that providers can take to help protect their client population from overdose. Finally, the training will describe the importance of postvention procedures for staff members following a client overdose death, with an emphasis on providing a "grief safe" environment for clinical workers to process traumatic client loss.
